Jason Meyer PREACHING & VISION

Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord.—I Corinthians 1:31

I celebrated my five-year anniversary on staff this year. This year feels to me like an opportunity to see the labors of the previous four years come to fruition. All that the Lord is doing could not possibly fit into an annual report, so let me mention five areas in particular and then close with a fuller personal picture.

Staff Camaraderie

The biggest challenge in the first three years was addressing some of the staff relational difficulties head-on. The gains in this area have been nothing short of miraculous. Two years ago, a group called the Best Christian Workplace Institute awarded us a very high score as a flourishing Christian Workplace. This year we received one of the highest scores they have given to a church. We are in the process of debriefing through the report from the Best Christian Workplace Institute and we see some places for further improvement. Continue to pray that more fruit would abound in this area.

Vision-Casting and Communications

This second area relates to the first. Three years ago, the pastoral staff and their wives met in my home. We used a whiteboard to collect our thoughts in answer to two questions: (1) what things are going well, and (2) what things need improvement? The most common answer to the first question was a growing sense of teamwork as campus teams. The most common answer to the second question was uncertainty about the common goals we were pursuing across all three campuses. The teams felt like they lacked an all-church vision for what they were all doing together. Our conversation that night was something of a precursor to our "Fill These Cities: 25 x '25" vision. Over the course of the next two years, the Lord brought together the four pieces of our 25 x '25 vision: (1) engaging 25 unengaged people groups, (2) planting 25 churches, (3) building the South Campus building, and (4) strengthening the core of Bethlehem.

Incidentally, the biggest area of improvement on the Best Christian Workplace Institute survey was in the area of communications and vision. The Lord has been kind to give us a clear sense of direction and unified goals. Please pray that we will continue to see fruit grow in this area.

Financial Generosity

I believe that growth in communication and vision brought a corresponding grace in terms of financial generosity. Giving was above our budget almost every week this fiscal year. That is nothing short of a miracle. We give God thanks for the 2 Corinthians 8:1–2 paradigm of generosity we witnessed: grace came down, joy came up, and generosity flowed forth.

South Campus Building

One of the great joys this year was to see the progress on the South Campus building from the ground up. The Lord gave us an unusually dry and warm October and November so that the building project moved ahead at a great pace. At this point, it looks like we may be able to begin using the building in September 2018. What an outpouring of grace we have witnessed to have the building project where it is now!

Unengaged Peoples and Church Planting

In terms of global outreach toward unengaged people groups, during Global Focus 2017 we saw 60 people come forward with a fresh stirring for the nations. Of the group gathering at Missions in the Manse, 32 people raised their hands to testify that they were actively praying about wanting to go to an unengaged people group. It is a wonder that we have more than 100 people in the Nurture Program and more than 110 units who are currently on the field pursuing our mission. These numbers are world-changing.

In terms of church planting, we have seen our first four churches planted (Word of Grace, Northfield Community Church, Redemption City Church, and Table Rock Church). We are praying that we would have three church planting residents moving forward in 2018 (one for each campus). We see many exciting prospects in the area of church planting, and God continues to give new mercies to encourage us in this endeavor every step of the way.

In conclusion, these five areas all testify to a corporate grace we have witnessed at Bethlehem. No one can take credit for them. This is the Lord's doing and it is marvelous in our eyes!

On a more personal note, 2017 was perhaps my happiest year as a pastor. Preaching through Mark 1–6 was one of the greatest blessings of my preaching ministry and preaching through John 1:1–14 for Advent was especially rich and rewarding. The Lord gave the gift of time and energy to make progress on three writing projects in 2017. I finished my book on Martyn Lloyd-Jones, made progress on my commentary on 2 Corinthians, and wrote a couple of essays on justification and pastoral theology that will appear in two separate books in 2018.

We have received so much grace from the Lord in 2017. Let us come boldly before the throne of grace and ask for even more in 2018.

I want to give God glory for his sustaining grace. This is not just a cliché, but the crucial reality that has kept me engaged and hopeful this year. The gospel of Jesus Christ is my compass to keep me oriented in the midst of challenging situations and my source of identity, comfort, and strength. What could be more powerful and sweet than the knowledge that Christ, the Son of God, loves me and is working for my good?

Personal

I am happy and humbled to report that, by God's grace, Theresa and I continue to love each other in our 28th year of marriage. Our weekly date has been a consistent time to enjoy our calling to be "one," along with our many other connections throughout an average day, week, and month. We continue to find joy in our calling as parents and ask God for wisdom to love our five children well in their various life stages.

Strategic Implementation

Partnership with Jason Meyer, *Pastor for Preaching & Vision*, remains vital and personally encouraging as we meet for accountability and fellowship, but primarily to consider the needs and opportunities of the flock.

The vision of "Fill these Cities: 25 x '25" has moved forward with significant progress in 2017. What a great encouragement to see the unifying effect this shared vision has had on our congregation, as well as the sense of mission it has cultivated.

This year I invested significant time and energy into revising our Constitution and Bylaws. This revision is meant to update our membership sections, to bring greater clarity to our vision for meaningful membership, and to align our governance with our doctrinal convictions regarding officers (elders and deacons) and the church. It was a highlight for me that these revisions passed with overwhelming support at our Annual Meeting on December 15. I praise God for what I believe will serve our congregation in our vision and mission. I thank God for partnership with Elder Brian Tabb in this effort.

In addition to the Constitution and Bylaw revisions, I have sought to serve our church by calling men and women to serve as deacons. After years of an "on again, off again" focus in this area, God has blessed us with deacons at each campus who are serving to assist the elders in the ministry of the word and prayer by meeting the practical needs of our church.

Lead Pastor for Downtown Campus

Life as a pastor at Bethlehem is full, with much striving for the faith of the gospel (Philippians 1:27). There are many joys and struggles as we corporately work out our salvation with fear and trembling. Here are just a few highlights from 2017:

- Joyfully laboring alongside the Downtown Campus pastoral staff and elders. The love and unity we share is a gift from God and I guard against taking it for granted. I aim to maintain connection with the Downtown Campus pastors to support them in their ministry through coaching and prayer.
- Appointing five congregational deacons (Nathan & Renee Warriner, Bob Sarna, Perry Ryan, and Jeff Noyed), along with a greater focus on this ministry.
- Establishing training for potential elders that we have called "Faithful Men Training."
- Engaging in some of the harder abuse cases and seeing God at work.
- Progressing in the transition of bringing on a *Minister for Women* at the Downtown Campus.
- Hiring Bryan Pickering as *Pastor for Care & Counseling* and partnering with him in ministry.
- Investing in our Small Group ministry overall and serving as a Small Group Coach.

Bethlehem, it is a great privilege to serve you as we worship and follow our great King Jesus and seek to spread the good news of salvation in him to our neighbors near and far.

Jon Grano OPERATIONS

What shall I render to the LORD for all his benefits to me? I will lift up the cup of salvation and call on the name of the LORD.—Psalm 116:12–13

In a year marked with benefits too numerous to count, Bethlehem's Operations Department continued to provide much of the behind-the-scenes trellis infrastructure that supports the vine of ministry initiatives.

In addition to specific department highlights listed below, three events are worth special mention. In April, we watched God work through Bethlehem's "Fill These Cities: 25 x '25" initiative as the congregation voted to build and fund a new South Campus facility. In early November, Bethlehem received accreditation from the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA) as a valued partner to help us steward resources in a wise and responsible manner. Then in late November, after a lengthy staff engagement survey process with 100+ participants, we were notified that Bethlehem was once again certified as a "Best Christian Workplace"—humbling and encouraging confirmation from an external source that testified to God's grace at work among us in a flourishing staff culture.

Team Highlights

Bethlehem's Operations Department is organized into six teams, each led by a dedicated and gifted director who oversees a particular ministry area. I'm thankful to God for each one—they make my work a joy!

Building & Property (Scott Brueske)

Oversees effective, efficient, safe operation and use of facilities, vehicles, and equipment.

- Repaired and repainted both Downtown and North Campus parking lots.
- Resurfaced North Campus sanctuary floor and remodeled office configurations.
- Implemented two energy-efficient Downtown
 Campus building upgrades: replaced original boiler
 burner to extend life of current boiler and replaced
 over 2,000 LED light bulbs.
- Coordinated significant repairs to the Downtown Campus <u>sanctuary blinds</u> and provided lighting for the <u>cross</u> in the main sanctuary window facing East.
- Provided smooth and uneventful logistical support for thousands of daily events and groups across three campus locations.

Communications (Amanda Knoke)

Oversees production of main communication materials and helps staff maximize communication efforts.

- Launched new "<u>bethlehem.church</u>" website in August, with special attention given to serving newcomers at each campus.
- Introduced Monthly cards to highlight all-church and campus-specific events, with the reverse of the card highlighting a focus on one church planter, outreach partner, and ministry opportunity of the month (global partners are featured each week in the *Weekly* e-newsletter).
- Worked to coordinate an <u>Advent devotional guide</u> with the North Campus to distribute in various formats for all campuses.
- Bid farewell to Graphic Designer Daniel Botkin, welcomed Graphic Designers Maddie Osgood (shared with Women's Ministry) and Christina Weisensel (shared with Bethlehem College & Seminary), and teamed with branding strategy consultant Annalisa Overgaard to review communications elements within ministry areas.
- Continued ongoing creation, coordination, and production of website content, Weekly email newsletter, worship folders and inserts, posters, brochures, seasonal guides, and social media.

Finances & Accounting (Thayne Rossiter)

Oversees design, implementation, and maintenance of financial operations and systems.

- Created excellent budget and payroll spreadsheet models that undergird Bethlehem ministry financial decisions, including foundational templates for our annual staff budgeting event and ongoing financial reporting.
- Welcomed Daewon Kim as Bethlehem's parttime Bookkeeper, replacing Aaron Geise who transitioned to provide administrative support for growing church planting efforts.
- Continued deployment of "<u>Tallie</u>," a digital expense management software system, to better streamline reimbursement processes.
- Began partnering with Tradition Bank to help finance our South Campus construction project.
- Oversaw successful annual audits for both Bethlehem and Bethlehem's 401(k) Employee Retirement Savings Trust.

Human Resources/Office (Joby Morgan)

Oversees human resources and office staff.

- Celebrated 100 years of God's goodness to us through the ministry of four of our pastors (Chuck Steddom and Sam Crabtree: 20 years each; David Livingston and Brad Nelson: 30 years each).
- Said goodbye to gifted and encouraging HR
 ministry assistant Allison Maurer as she welcomed
 her son into the world. We welcomed Jake Wood
 whom the Lord gifted and raised up for this time.
- Provided administrative HR support for many staff transitions. Though the core of our staff is solid and stable with many serving for decades (witness the 100-year celebration), HR helped the staff through 136 staffing transitions in 2017, ranging from welcoming a new pastor (Steven Lee) after a long and healthy search, to saying goodbye to several part-time staff members.
- Provided ongoing staff support and care, including coordination of Bethlehem's annual benefits open enrollment period and bi-weekly payroll.
- Continued overseeing the process of moving all our employee records from paper to electronic.

Information Technology (Andrew Lang)

Oversees design, implementation, and maintenance of computer systems, network infrastructure, phone system, office technology, and information systems.

- Supported roll-out of new "bethlehem.church" website, using a new content management system and integrated with our MinistryPlatform church management database for event information.
- Transitioned to using MinistryPlatform as Bethlehem's facilities scheduling and management system, cutting the number of facilities management event sources from three to one.
- Switched to a new giving system at <u>bethlehem</u>.
 <u>onlinegiving.org</u> to provide features such as
 text giving, saved giving profiles, text message
 autoresponders, and improved integration with
 <u>MinistryPlatform</u>.
- Transitioned our internal and external computer systems to use the new bethlehem.church domain that we secured when the new .church top-level domains became available and moved our MinistryPlatform server from the Downtown Campus to an offsite data center with redundant power, internet backbone connections, and physical security.

• Updated our wifi radio and management infrastructure at all three campuses, gaining significant performance and capacity improvements and streamlining administration of users.

Media (Timothy Frederick)

Oversees effective and efficient operation and use of media equipment in both weekend worship and weekday settings.

- Began a new phase of multi-year updates to major systems in both North and Downtown Campus sanctuaries.
- Collaborated with excellent Audio/Visual/Lighting systems integrator to design all of the AVL systems for the new South Campus sanctuary.
- Forged new partnerships and cultivated existing ones with equipment suppliers and manufacturers to implement new technologies and retire aging ones in sanctuaries and classrooms.
- Updated many classrooms at the Downtown Campus with new presentation technologies, especially for Bethlehem College & Seminary use.
- Supported a myriad of worship services and special events across all three campuses.
- Continued to invest in the lives of a growing number of volunteers—we could not do what we do in Media Ministry without them!

Other Ministry Focuses

In addition to overseeing the six main Operations areas, my role as *Lead Pastor for Operations* in 2017 involved ongoing participation with the following teams:

- The pastoral staff lead team met bi-weekly to coordinate ministry across all campuses and help pre-process topics for the pastoral staff and elders.
- The organizational elders and North Campus congregational elders (subsets of our Council of Elders) met monthly to focus on issues affecting the entire church and North Campus, respectively.
- The **Financial and Property Administrators** (FPAs) met monthly to provide wise counsel on a wide range of financial and property issues. I'm especially thankful for Charlie May's outstanding service as recording secretary in 2017 to help capture meeting content.
- The staffing resource team met biweekly to prioritize and coordinate various staffing issues.
- The **health insurance resource team** helped evaluate and select appropriate health insurance

coverage for Bethlehem full-time staff—our insurance premiums dropped 5% for 2017! We praise God for the health he's given our staff and a second consecutive year of reduced premiums.

• The **South Campus building team** meets regularly to coordinate construction of our new campus. In 2017, I began attending meetings to help ensure coordination with Operations.

Numerical Highlights

God's many benefits to Bethlehem in 2017 may also be viewed through contribution and attendance statistics:

- Contributions of \$10.95M exceeded Bethlehem's
 One Fund operating budget. In addition, nearly
 \$800K in special designated gifts were given
 toward the South Campus. Given our staff's
 underspending of the budget, we were able to
 replenish needed reserves and designate portions of
 the surplus to the South Campus building project.
 See our 2017 Financial Secretary and Treasurer
 reports for details.
- Average attendance (3,442) at Bethlehem's six weekend worship services decreased 3.4% compared to 2016 (3,563), with Easter weekend the highest attendance (5,400) in 2017.
- Average attendance at weekend worship services, by campus:
 - Downtown: 1,594 (2016: 1,659) in three worship services.
 - North: 1,385 (2016: 1,380) in two worship services.
 - South: 463 (2016: 524) in one worship service.
 - The North Campus Sunday 9am worship service continued to have the highest average attendance (837), followed by Downtown Sunday 9am (726).

Personal Notes

This past year was noteworthy for several reasons. In July, we had the first "Grano extended family reunion" in decades as we gathered together at Lake Vermilion in northern Minnesota. In September, our second grandchild, Natalie Joy, was born to Charlie & Rebecca May. Both Pam and I thank God often for the privilege of being grandparents—"twice the fun and half the work" as parenting! Pam continues her involvement with children's worship-leading and music education, and I regularly marvel at God's grace that allows me to serve among such a gifted staff these past 12 years.

May we all continue to grow in grace together in 2018.

CHURCH PLANTING

"I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."—Matthew 16:18

It is with a profound sense of dependence on Christ Jesus that we as a local church are involved in planting new churches, near and far. Planting churches is implicit in Christ's Great Commission and explicit in the apostolic pattern given to us in the New Testament. Let's be very clear: Planting churches is God's work. Christ commissions us (Matthew 28:18–20). God calls planters (Luke 10:2, Acts 13:2). By the word of Christ people are granted the gift of saving faith (Romans 10:17). Believers are gathered, and the Spirit sets apart elders and establishes new churches (Acts 20:28). Clearly, in our "Fill These Cities: 25 x '25" goal to plant 25 new churches by the year 2025, we are utterly dependent upon the Lord to triumph over the power of hell and build his Church.

25 x '25 Update

Since the inception of the 25 x '25 vision in 2016, the elders have approved one church revitalization (or "JumpStart") and three new churches ...

- Word of Grace Baptist, Minneapolis, MN—2016 (Paul Przybylowski)
- Northfield Community Church, Northfield, MN—2016 (Jonathon Woodyard)
- 3. Redemption City, Rochester, MN—2017 (Adam Pohlman & Jake Tonak)
- 4. Table Rock, Boise, ID—2017 (Ryan Eagy)

Future Planters/Jumpstart Pastors

Currently, 12 students are enrolled in the seminary Church Planting & Revitalization concentration. In addition to the courses required for the M.Div. pastoral degree, these students complete four elective courses: a) The Gospel and Personal Evangelism, b) Church Planting and Revitalization, c) Cross-Cultural Planting, and d) Church Growth and Renewal.

Additionally, we are working seriously with five other planters at various stages in the approval process. Each of them has benefitted from Bethlehem College & Seminary in their preparation.

Bethlehem's church planting residency is one of our primary tools for the final phase of planter preparation. In 2018, we are budgeting for three new church planting residents. Tyler Mykkanen has been approved by the South Campus Elders as the 2018 *Church Planting Resident, South*, beginning after he graduates this Spring from Bethlehem College & Seminary (MDiv). Please pray for two more church planting residents to be selected and approved.

Connecting

In addition to developing Bethlehem's church planting efforts, I had the joy of preaching in seven church plants, including the 10th Anniversary of Grace Church, Memphis (January 2017).

I attended the "Just Gospel" Conference in Atlanta with my wife, Kathy. We brought with us the admissions exhibit for Bethlehem College & Seminary in order to increase minority applicants to our school.

Along with Pastor Todd Rasmuson and our Global Outreach Team, I attended the "Missio-Nexus" missions conference to begin to think and work together on church planting in a global context. In October, we gathered with more than 80 pastors and wives at the annual "Treasuring Christ Together Network Retreat." And lastly, I attended the "Church Planting Leaders Fellowship" gathering that included sessions led by Ed Stetzer and Tim Keller.

European Church Planting Trip

In November 2017, Kathy and I set out to explore different locations in Europe at which we could bring potential church planters in order to give them exposure to the challenge of planting churches in post-Christian cultures. Please pray, as we hope to return to the Czech Republic, Sweden, and perhaps Ireland with a team of future church planters in 2018. Our prayer is that by networking with our global partners who are church planting in Europe, we might catalyze thinking about effective church planting in other post-Christian or anti-Christian contexts—such as our own.

I could not keep up with the students, residents, and planters without the help of Cleon Engel, *Coordinator for Church Planting*. Cleon has been a gift of grace to me and to the planters, their families, and the churches. As a mature godly man who grew up as a "pastor's kid," he has proven himself to be a wise coach, advisor, mentor, and counselor many times over. Cleon and I have sought to maintain relationships with the students, residents, and planters throughout the year. In addition to Cleon, working with me at Bethlehem is Aaron Geise, who serves as our part-time *Administrative Assistant for Church Planting*. Many thanks to both of these men for their always happy, collaborative help, thinking, and work.

And, I do not take it for granted that my wife, Kathy, has not only supported me in the ministry but has leaned in wholeheartedly at many points to serve and love the church planters and their wives in the challenges of planting, pastoral ministry, and family life.

LEADERSHIP DEVELOPMENT BETHLEHEM COLLEGE & SEMINARY

Great are the works of the LORD, studied by all who delight in them.—Psalm 111:2

As 2017 folds into 2018, Bethlehem College & Seminary is cherishing where God has brought us since our founding. The Bethlehem Institute was conceived in 1997 and became Bethlehem College & Seminary in 2009. Twenty years of offering graduate-level theological education in the context of the local church is increasingly bearing fruit both near and far. This summer, I was able to make three trips (Middle East, South Asia, and East Africa) to visit our graduates and see some of the fruit of their labors. Other professors are also visiting graduates or bringing current students to gospel-famished peoples in difficult-to-reach places.

At its core, what it means to be a church-based seminary is that the academy and the church are mutually interdependent as we seek to spread a passion for the supremacy of God in all things for the joy of all peoples through Jesus Christ. Momentum is building in this symbiotic relationship in our mission to plant 25 churches by the year 2025. One of our seminary students and his wife have committed themselves to serve an unreached, unengaged people group and have already been appointed as candidates by Pioneers. They plan to reach out to one or more of the people groups who are currently unreached and untargeted. This year several of our graduates are teaming together to plant Treasuring Christ Together churches in Boise, Idaho; Rochester, Minnesota; and Northfield, Minnesota. Others are involved in church planting, pastoring existing churches, serving as elders, and holding other leadership positions. Graduates from our college are dispersing into the marketplace and church ministry roles in various parts of the country.

In his end-of-the-year Academic Dean report, Brian Tabb summarized highlights of what God has helped us accomplish in this past year. We have...

- Developed and approved a new degree program: MA in Exegesis and Theology.
- 2. Hired three well-qualified faculty members (Chris Bruno, Brian Hanson, and Rick Shenk).
- 3. Accepted international students from El Salvador and Myanmar into the MDiv program, awarding them the Alex Steddom International Scholarship.

- Launched MDiv graduates as TCT church planters in Northfield, Rochester, and Boise.
- 5. Promoted continued scholarship among the faculty: Chris Bruno, Andy Naselli, Jason DeRouchie, James McGlothlin, John Piper, and Brian Tabb have all published one or more books, and Ryan Griffith completed his PhD. Please pray for Johnathon Bowers and Joe Rigney as they each seek to finish a PhD in 2018.

The year of 2017 also marked Connie Kopischke's 30 years of pouring her life out for the mission of Bethlehem Baptist Church and Bethlehem College & Seminary. In the early years of The Bethlehem Institute, Connie played almost every role imaginable: registrar, bursar, librarian, IT person, admissions director, housing coordinator, event planner, and my personal assistant—coordinating my calendar, arranging my travel logistics, and the list could go on. As TBI evolved into Bethlehem College & Seminary and grew into what it is today, she has narrowed her focus to registrar, bursar, and institutional researcher, while still cheerfully assisting me in multiple ways.

Barnabas Teams

Global Focus

The 2017 theme for Global Focus was "Engaging Islam." The 11 days of Global Focus (October 11-22) were launched by a special Wednesday night event featuring both local engagement from those serving in Muslim ministry in the Twin Cities and international Muslim engagement from one of our global partners. Additionally, Pastor Jason Meyer shared a biographical message based on the life of Raymond Lull. Pastor Chuck Steddom led a choir in international songs declaring God's glory among the nations. Georges Houssney was our guest preacher for the weekend of October 14/15. Pastor Jason preached to conclude Global Focus on October 21/22. At the end of the message, Pastor Jason asked, "Who senses a fresh stirring by God to go to the nations?" Across our three campuses, 60 new people came forward indicating a "fresh" call to go to the nations. The Meyer hosted 65 at their home for the "Missions in the Manse" event, where I asked, "Who senses God might be leading them to an unengaged people group?" Thirty-two people raised their hands.

Nurture Program

We prepare our people for global outreach ministry with our Nurture Program, a program consisting of a combination of strategies and resources for global ministry. Currently 99 are enrolled in the program, as compared to 116 last year.

BAM (Business as Missions)

The BAM committee in 2017 included Don Hoffert, Scott Rebney, Brad Nelson, Keith Anderson, Richard Swanson, Steve Walmsley, Paul Lindberg, and Jonathan Kurapati. Several others assisted occasionally and served as consultants.

Global Diaconate

The Global Diaconate task force oversees the disbursement of Bethlehem funds to ministries of mercy serving the poorest of the poor and those suffering around the globe. The Downtown Campus Worship Department was blessed in 2017 to labor for God's kingdom. January began, as every January does, celebrating Bethlehem's priorities. Our department hosted the *All-Church Concert of Word & Prayer*. Later, our weekend services celebrated the sanctity of human life and the importance of ethnic harmony. At the end of the month, volunteers from all three campuses led worship for the Bethlehem College & Seminary *Conference for Pastors + Church Leaders*. During the conference, my wife Lisa and I hosted over thirty worship leaders from around the country in our home for a wonderful evening of fellowship and encouragement.

In February, our services highlighted Bethlehem's "25 x '25" initiative through a series of sermons on church planting (Kenny Stokes), global outreach (global partner Ryan C.), and strengthening the core (Ken Currie). We were also thrilled to welcome several new covenant members into our church body.

March was our first month in the Gospel of Mark sermon series, and we spent the majority of 2017 slowly working our way through the first six chapters of the book. I attended a symposium at Duke Divinity School, focused on "how worship leaders and pastors can discern the right kind of worship music to use in any given context." It was a great chance to connect with many ministry friends from around the country.

In April, we celebrated our Savior, the Light of the World, risen from the dead. On Palm Sunday, our youth choir helped lead worship. On Maundy Thursday, we remembered Christ's work on the cross through Scripture readings and hymns, and the darkness of our sinful world, represented by gradually-dimming candles. On Easter, we added a fourth weekend service and were delighted to be led in worship by our adult choir, directed by Kristin Borski. We celebrated baptisms in every service as symbols of new life in Christ. A special thank you to Annalisa Overgaard for her beautiful Easter visuals. The last weekend in April featured the ministry of Bethlehem College & Seminary. Our campus was led in worship by Luke Salik, a fourth-year seminary

student in the *Master of Divinity* program (*Worship Pastor Concentration*). He is a blessing to me, our ministry, and our congregation.

May celebrated the commencement ceremony for Bethlehem College & Seminary's graduating class. We thank the Lord for these graduates, who are being sent out in his name. May was also the first time that we heard a message from Richie Stark, *Pastoral Resident for Youth & Family Discipleship*, who reminded us that "There Is Power In Remembering."

June was a relatively quiet month. I spent a portion of the summer traveling with my family, which provided Luke Salik additional opportunities to lead our congregation in worship. We were again blessed by his gifts. Pray for Luke and his wife, Andrea, as they, Lord willing, pursue church planting ministry following Luke's graduation in 2018.

In July, I preached from Isaiah 44 on "Worship: The Alarm Clock for Idolatry." What a joy to spend extensive time in God's word and share his truths with our church family. While several ministries disengage for a summer break, our Downtown worship volunteers kept serving and providing services throughout the remainder of July and August. We taught a haunting new song, "He Is Given," which traces Christ's life as given, stricken, and risen for our sake. I attended a writers' summit for DesiringGod to help my ministry of writing. Our Downtown Campus heard from guest preachers Brian Tabb ("Revere the Risen King") and Kempton Turner ("Be With Jesus").

September saw the launch of our Fall season and a wonderful week of baptisms. I never tire of hearing the miraculous stories of how the Lord is calling people to himself. What a privilege! We continued our sermon series in the book of Mark, and we witnessed the incoming seminary students of Bethlehem College & Seminary affirm the covenant of their institution. It is always exciting to consider how the Lord may use these men and their families in the years to come.

In the month of October, the pastoral staff attended the *Convergence Conference* in Oklahoma City, which encouraged its attendees to "embrace both the functional authority of God's word and the full range of miraculous gifts of the Spirit, all to the glory of God in Christ." We all departed grateful for the time. It was a deep blessing to my own soul. I continue to dream of how to implement those conference themes at Bethlehem. Later that month, we heard from George Houssney, founder of Horizons International, on "Wisdom and Foolishness in World Missions"—part of our *Global Focus* series. Our choir sang the Lord's prayer in Arabic, "Abana alathi fi ssama," as a prayer for all the peoples.

At the beginning of November, we taught a new communion song, "Dear Jesus, As I Take This Bread," written by two of Bethlehem's members. I attended the Evangelical Theological Society Conference with several Bethlehem College & Seminary professors. It was wonderful to spend time with these brothers and to present a summary of my own dissertation on Inaugurated Eschatology. During this month, our ministry invested in a major restoration for our sanctuary's Steinway piano. It was a much needed, and much appreciated, improvement!

We began the Advent season at the beginning of December. At each weekend service, a child brought a lit candle into the dimmed sanctuary, symbolizing the Light of the World coming to save us from our sinful darkness. Both our choirs sang this month. The youth choir lead us in "Come Behold the Wondrous Mystery," and the adult choir sang a beautiful rendition of "Who Would Have Dreamed." For Advent, Pastor Jason Meyer turned to John 1 to remind us of the practical and powerful implications of Christ's incarnation. Many thanks to Annalisa Overgaard and Ann Mekala for decorating the sanctuary, as we celebrated the coming of our King.

As a worship ministry, we end 2017 by looking to the Lord. We pray that he would help us see clearly what he has done and is doing in Jesus. We pray that he would help us experience a foretaste of the embrace that awaits us and to fully sense what we already know of his great love toward us.

Jared Wass DOWNTOWN SMALL GROUPS & ADULT DISCIPLESHIP

Speaking the truth in love, we are to grow up in every way into him who is the head, into Christ, from whom the whole body, joined and held together by every joint with which it is equipped, when each part is working properly, makes the body grow so that it builds itself up in love.—Ephesians 4:15–16

It ought to be normative and prominent in the local church for people to know and disciple one another. Each of the 59 New Testament texts calling Christians to the "one anothers" (instruct one another, serve one another, etc.) bears witness to this. As a church we are working, praying, and trusting Christ to create a culture and structures to nurture, sustain, and grow this kind of life together in the hopes that we would be disciples of Jesus who make disciples of Jesus (Matthew 28:18–20).

Strategy

As we consider a discipleship strategy, it's worth noting two things: it is foolish to live by a strategy, yet it is also foolish to try to live without one. Israel was warned against trusting in alliances with other nations and the weapons of warfare more than in God for their security (Isaiah 31:1, Psalm 20:7). A strategy does not win the day. Yet we are also given a window into the hardships that come when ministry is attempted without a proper strategy. In Exodus 18 Moses' father-in-law, Jethro, saw that all Israel looked to Moses to inquire of God and receive counsel. Moses became a bottleneck, and people in need entered a logjam. Jethro advised Moses to recruit others to share the load of discipleship (Exodus 18:17–23).

Moses' unique role in discipleship was not canceled out. He was still to teach Israel God's statutes and laws and help them walk in it. God's role as the primary shepherd was not canceled out; God's presence and direction was still their primary hope. But Jethro advocated a strategy to delegate discipling responsibility to others to bear the burden, not in place of him, but with him.

Bethlehem's Strategy

In September, we introduced our discipleship strategy at the Downtown Campus in three parts: home, hospital, and gym. Home is small group life, which is the priority structure for personal discipleship at our church. The hospital is needed when people are in crisis or need acute care, which represents our counseling ministry. The gym, our classroom ministry, is where people go for training to build up their strength. The counseling ministry is led by Pastor Bryan Pickering, but small groups and classroom ministry are under adult discipleship.

Small Groups

At the Downtown Campus, we currently have 66 small groups with 746 people involved. These 66 groups are led by 180 leaders, co-leaders, or apprentices preparing to lead in the future. We are always seeking to recruit, train, and deploy leaders for groups and we have created a new training called the Lead Table. "Lead" is an acronym for "leadership and discipleship" and "table" communicates that a good deal of the training is a roundtable discussion. Twenty people took this new course in the Fall.

Classroom Discipleship

We continue to offer College Connection, King's Friends, Mosaic, All Nations Fellowship, and *Escuela Dominical* (Hispanic Sunday School) as Sunday School classes. This Fall, we offered How People Change, which teaches basic Christian counseling practices; Mining God's Word, which helps people read the Bible better; Love the City, which teaches people to love our city better; and Marriage Enrichment & Pre-Marriage Class, which teaches how to love and care for a spouse/fiancé better. We hope to establish a core curriculum of classes we can rotate through to touch on important aspects of Christianity.

Closina

This Fall, I preached a sermon from Ephesians 4:II-I6 entitled "Equipped, Connected, and Growing." This text is foundational for discipleship and small group life. We will be a growing body as we are a connected body, each part equipped by the leaders of the church to walk in the power of the Holy Spirit in such a way that they are helping others grow in Christ. This Christ is the head of our body, giving us direction, and he is also the gospel, which is our power for salvation (Romans I:I6) and sanctification (Romans I6:25). May the Lord help us to speak the truth in love to one another that we would build each other up into our head, who is Christ.

I am deeply thankful for the opportunity to serve our Downtown Campus by working with you for your joy in Jesus as we seek to apply God's glorious gospel to the general and specific troubles and pleasures of everyday life in the power of the Holy Spirit.

Equipping the Saints for the Work of Ministry (Ephesians 4:12)

Christian Counseling & Educational Foundation Classes In 2017, we offered seven CCEF graduate-level counseling courses at the Downtown Campus.

- **Dynamics of Biblical Change** (2x) A course on counseling model, diving into answering questions like, how does Christ's past grace, present grace, and future grace speak to our hearts and change how we live our daily lives? This course is about people. It is about how we face the troubles of life. It is about how we deal with our inner struggles. It is about how we change into Jesus' image.
- Helping Relationships A course on counseling method, seeking to answer the question, how do you apply a growing understanding of biblical counseling in your everyday relationships?
- **Biblical Interpretation** (2x) A course on hermeneutics (interpreting Scripture), especially in a personal ministry and counseling context. This course helps students understand both people and the Bible more thoroughly and is designed to strengthen their ability to rivet scriptural truth to real-life ministry situations.
- **Human Personality** A course on biblical anthropology, focusing especially on answering the questions: Who am I? Who are we? And most importantly, since we are made in the image of God, we also had the pleasure of asking, Who is God?
- Counseling & Physiology A course focusing on the embodied aspect of our embodied-soul nature as human beings created in the image of God. A biblical view of human beings begins with an understanding that we are both body and spirit. From this reality flows a nuanced pastoral approach to suffering and sin in a person's life that takes seriously both the physical and spiritual aspects of the struggle at hand.

To date, we've trained 81 students (24 men and 57 women) through CCEF classes. Currently 53 of these students are a part of Bethlehem and 34 of them call the Downtown Campus home. These students are currently involved in a wide range of ministry roles, including:

I treasure walking with students into deeper, richer, and more robust expressions of wise and compassionate care.

Bethlehem College & Seminary

I have the privilege of co-teaching the counseling classes to our seminarians with my friend and fellow-Bethlehem member, Glen Bloomstrom.

- Sixteen men completed their 2nd semester of counseling
- Seventeen men completed their 1st semester of counseling
- Topics Covered: Counseling Models, Methods, and Local Church Context, Suffering, Grief & Loss, Guilt & Shame, Anger, Fear & Anxiety, Depression, Crisis & Trauma, Suicide, Alcoholism, Addictions, Eating Disorders, Abuse/Oppression & Neglect, Infidelity, Diseases Affecting Mood, Intellect, Behavior, Psychiatric Disorders, Same-Sex Attraction, and Gender Identity/Transgender Issues
- Mentoring three students: Luke Salik (4th year),
 Matt Denzer (3rd year), and Eric Melling (2nd year)

To watch these men prepare to launch (or relaunch!) into a vast ministry field is humbling and delightful.

David Powlison in April

We were blessed to have CCEF's executive director, David Powlison, with us for three days in April. David invested significant time with Bethlehem College & Seminary faculty and students, Redemption: Twin Cities counseling staff, CCEF students at Bethlehem, and our wider congregation. His visit was a great encouragement to us to lean into the task of growing in grace and skill for personal ministry with God's help.

Group Counseling Training

In August several from our Downtown Campus and church invested a very full three days into learning how to do group counseling more effectively.

CCEF Conference

In October, several folks from the Downtown Campus traveled down to Frisco, Texas, to attend CCEF's national conference on Family. While enjoying the refreshment through worship and teaching, we were also able to invest time in small groups to learn with and from others in vocational counseling. This time of learning included a professional counselor from The Village Church in Dallas, a counseling pastor from Parkside Church near Cleveland, Ohio, a counseling center director in Chapel Hill, North Carolina, and many who work with CCEF.

Implementing a System of Care (Colossians 1:28)

I and the other Downtown Campus staff continue to labor to develop and implement a robust, holistic system of care to deploy as needed. As a norm, this system includes pastoral oversight, focused care (could be a counselor or other specialist), and community involvement (most often a small group). We made good strides in this area in 2017 and look forward to more growth in grace in 2018. We are also deploying our CCEF students in counseling relationships on an ongoing basis.

Joining God's Heart for the Oppressed at the Downtown Campus (Psalm 103:6)

In our 12 DART cases at the Downtown Campus, we've been blessed to come alongside those who are struggling. Many of these men and women—by the powerful grace of God at work in their hearts—continue to take good steps forward with God's help. We continue to grow together as a staff in our understanding of the dynamics present in oppressive relationships and how to be helpful to those in this situation. The Downtown Campus hosted Abuse/Oppression trainings with Chris Moles (April) and Darby Strickland (November)—both guest speakers have been a sweet gift from the Lord to us!

Thank You (1 Corinthians 1:4)

I want to thank God publicly for all of you who have labored with our care and counseling ministry by holding up the helpers and those being helped to our Heavenly Father in prayer. I also want to thank him for all of your efforts to show tangible and refreshing expressions of God's steadfast love toward his people—from the strongest to the weakest—and everyone in between. We know the Lord has been pleased to sustain this ministry through your seeking his face on our behalf. Please keep praying for fresh grace and new mercies! I also want to say a special thanks to God for a few of his many relational graces I get to experience on a regular basis:

We encourage the older women to be examples and teachers of the younger women. We are committed to raising up women who exemplify biblical womanhood to the glory of God.

Bible Studies

- Five winter studies were offered; 80 women participated.
- Two summer studies were offered; 137 women participated.
- Three Fall studies were offered; 93 women participated.
- Children's programs were offered at morning studies.

Titus 2 Ministry

- On January 25, 100 young women attended the Titus 2 Mentee Coffee to learn about and sign up for a mentoring group.
- This year's Titus 2 Ministry offerings included 12 focus groups, 30 book groups, and 28 one-on-one mentoring relationships.
- We had 85 mentors ministering to 300 mentees.
- A group of 50 women attended the Titus 2
 Appreciation Coffee on June 4. The mentors enjoyed brunch, special music, testimonies, a word of encouragement, and the opportunity to share ministry ideas.
- More than 100 women attended one or more of the three Titus 2 Mentor Training sessions this Fall.

MOMS

- MOMS was led by Krista Coronado and Janette Takata.
- A total of 76 moms were involved with 92 infants and children in children's programming.

Events

Shepherding Our Women Well, August 5

Purpose: To equip our leaders to better shepherd our women.

 Three seminars were offered: Basic Online Bible Study Skills, Online Bible Study Skills In Depth, and Small Group Dynamics.

Women's Fall Kick-Off, September 9

Purpose: To begin our year of ministry by bringing our women together for a time of worship and getting to know some of the areas of the church where they can connect to serve in the church or its associated ministries. To introduce our theme of contentment.

Christmas Luncheon, December 6

Purpose: To prepare our hearts for Christmas by focusing on Jesus. Theme: "Joy to the World"

- More than 300 women attended. The tables were beautifully decorated and hosted by 38 women.
- Worship time included traditional carols, readings from Scripture, and testimonies that focused on Jesus' birth and his life changing gospel.

Overview

In the conclusion of my 2014 annual report, I said, "The glory of Christ and the grace he brings has risen more fully to the surface this year, and I believe it is just beginning to blossom and will do so even more by God's faithful grace in 2015 and following. I look forward to giving annual reports in the years to come, of this unfolding story of God's grace in Christ to undeserving sinners at Bethlehem among families which bring both salvation and sanctification for our joy. If I had to summarize this glorious theme in a word it would be a name: Jesus."

It has been three years since writing those words, but they are as fresh now as they were then. God's grace has been relentless for our joy in helping us make much of his Son.

Evidences of Grace

Disability Ministry

God's hand in the disability/special needs ministry has been seen in the provision of gaining and training volunteers to serve as 1:1 buddies to come alongside students of all ages with special needs. New students are participating in our His Strength adaptive class. And joy has been given in writing interactive Bible lessons for this class, which brings teaching about Jesus Christ into each lesson. God has granted sweet moments of ministry to personally connect with parents in encouragement and prayer either on Sundays, in their homes, at coffee shops, in hospitals, or during our quarterly Hope Keepers gatherings for moms. God continues to supply for our Respite Nights. We've held nine Respite Night events over the past three years, which have been a valuable support to our families (Downtown and North Campuses) and have provided partnerships with new volunteers and opportunities for small groups, college students, adults with special needs, and families to serve together. This year has been particularly challenging for me to serve many families in crisis, battling significant health issues—child, parent, or both—and the added and ongoing needs for our growing adult ministry, but in all of this God continues to teach me to be fully dependent on him, leaning on prayer, his good timing, and his grace along the way.

Nursery Ministry

It is our joy to continue to spread the fragrance of Jesus in and through our nurseries and to pray for each child by name when he/she is in our care. Life is a gift from God, and he added 51 new babies to our roster in 2017. Another testimony to our Father's help and grace in ministering to children is seen in serving our Women's Ministry by providing childcare for MOMs and Women's Bible Studies, as well as providing childcare for Small Group Ministry's quarterly Small Group Leaders' Dinners.

Parent Support

- God has granted another year of grace for the parent gatherings in the Parent Room. Though we discussed many topics, the heart and soul of our conversation was the gospel of Jesus Christ and our method was in a devotional style were we talked, prayed, and sang. It was a joy to bookend our Sunday School ministry in the Spring and Fall with family gatherings. With God's help, we are finding ways to serve families in and around our long-standing ministry areas.
- There was another rich measure of grace granted to parents who are grieving the loss of a child, through the development of a Miscarriage Memorial Service held in the Spring and the Fall.
- Jesus left the glory of heaven, expressing love to us by coming to earth. I am continually granted grace to, in small measure, follow his lead by visiting families in their world—in their homes. This remains a very meaningful expression of family support for which I am grateful.

Sunday School

The "steady state" ministry of Sunday School remains marked and blessed by God's grace. He continues to bring volunteers to serve for the 9am and 11am services. The refinement in the Fall of creating a Middle School model (to include Grade 6) under the leadership of our youth ministry has served us well.

Gospel on the Grass

My hope was that this event would help us take a step forward in bringing the gospel to our neighborhoods. I made mention of this in the 2016 report, but it did not move forward as I thought it might. God is sovereign over it all, and I am still reflecting on lessons learned.

Evidences of Grace Yet to Come

Sunday School

With God's help, we will move one final class into our study of Luke and Acts. Therefore, all our children in Grades 2–5, which meet Sundays at 9am and 11am, will start afresh in the Gospel of Luke in September. Fall 2018 will begin our second run at this four-year rotation of beholding Christ and watching him build his Church. God has granted so much grace to us, and I look forward to more in the future.

Master Track

I plan on providing a parenting "Master Track" in our Parent Room in the Fall that I trust will become an every-other year rotation to provide parents meaningful conversation and prayer around some very important family life issues. The constant theme will remain the glory of Christ and the transforming power of the gospel for both parents and their children.

Overview

The Middle School & Sr High ministries are blessed with 50 volunteer staff. Their responsibilities include helping lead worship, giving announcements, caring for small groups, coordinating events, and maintaining relationships outside of planned events.

Programming

This was a pivotal year in that at the Downtown Campus transitioned from having a Jr High Ministry to having a Middle School Ministry. We felt that students were growing out of the Children's Ministry by the end of Grade 5 and ready for Middle School Ministry. I am excited for the change, because I was a Grade 6 homeroom teacher for eight years and I felt we could minister to these students in similar ways to our Jr High Ministry.

During the school year, the youth ministry meets on Wednesday nights. We have made a more concentrated focus on small groups in the Sr High Ministry. On the 1st and 3rd Wednesday of the month, we meet as one big group. The 2nd and 4th Wednesday of the month we have set aside for small groups. During this time, small group leaders are encouraged to use the big group lesson from the week before to engage the lives of the students.

The High School and Middle School groups have been studying Ephesians on Wednesday nights. On Sunday mornings they have worked their way through a study called "Story-Formed Life."

We hosted many events for the students in 2017. Some of the all-church events with the North and South Campus students include the Twins game, Jr High Summer Camp, and Jr & Sr High Winter Retreat. As a Downtown Campus group, we have had an event just about every month. These range from pool parties, our own "Academy Awards" Weekend, and a Sr High Fall Kick-Off camping trip.

Fruit

The Lord has been kind to us in showing us his mercy. He has moved among the Downtown Campus youth in mighty ways. We have seen him free students of demon possession and oppression at Jr High Summer Camp.

We are seeing students follow Christ in deeper ways and desiring to be baptized. This has given the Downtown Campus staff extra motivation to see the Lord glorify himself in mighty ways.

Closing

This has been a great year in which the Lord has shown himself to us. He has drawn us closer to himself by displaying his mighty power over the enemy. This is what Paul prayed for the Ephesians—that his readers would know the hope and the riches of his glorious inheritance and the immeasurable greatness of his power. October 2017 marked the beginning of the sixth year of the North Campus Counseling Center. The original vision for a counseling ministry at the North Campus was to task a pastor to recruit, train, and oversee a team of lay people to walk alongside those in the congregation who are struggling. This ministry continues to grow, both in numbers of people served and in the number of counselors eager to serve through biblical counseling.

I am continually amazed when I witness the joy and excitement that our lay counselors experience through serving in the care of souls. These men and women walk alongside others in the body of Christ, many with overwhelming, often heavy burdens, and it is evident that God has clearly called and equipped these caregivers for this ministry. Ephesians 4:11–16 is beautifully illustrated through the ministry of these lay counselors.

Mary Wilkin (my right-hand lady) and I decided to take the year off from training new lay counselors given the transition time that my retirement in April will necessitate. Instead, we are focusing on deepening the skills of our current lay counselors through continuing education. Each Monday night about twenty of us gather to discuss the material from an online course we are auditing taught by David Powlison. These gatherings are rich as we experience an "iron sharpening iron" through our interaction with one another as we verbally process David's teaching.

Once again I took a group to Faith Church in LaFayette, Indiana, for a week of training in February. We obviously are maturing as a group of counselors because all of us were in Track 4, the advanced track that changes each year so you can attend without repetition. The week at Faith was intense—sitting in training seminars about eight hours a day. Yet the seminars are very helpful and practical. I always learn things that I can bring home and apply.

My wife, Mary, and I made the trek to Frisco, Texas, in October to attend the Christian Counseling & Education Foundation (CCEF) Annual Conference. This year's theme was, "Family: Embracing the Blessing, Facing the Brokenness." The conference was very thought-provoking—challenging us to consider the reality that families can often be a mixed bag, bringing both joy and sorrows. Several Bethlehem lay counselors attended this conference with us.

The Lord has blessed the North Campus in 2017 in our Neighborhood Outreach and Welcome Team ministries! Let me mention just a few of these highlights.

Neighborhood Outreach

- Our Wednesday ESL ministry continues to be extremely fruitful. Chrissy Kline, our faithful coordinator, sends me stories of God's great work among the 50 students and 50 tutors. Here is one such story: "I ended up in All Nations Fellowship after church yesterday. I saw one of the tutors who had brought his student to the class. Phyllis & Greg Smith were sharing the gospel with him in Chinese for at least 15 minutes from the time I arrived. Obviously, I don't know exactly what they said, but at the end, she gave him the bridge tract and they all prayed together. This student's wife became a Christian earlier in the year and they are returning to China next month."

 The Mounds View Police Department now has 19 support groups from North Campus serving, communicating with, and praying for each of their 19 officers.
- David Zhang started a Sermon Discussion in Mandarin each Sunday after church this summer.

God's Transforming Grace

Our Women's Ministry theme for the 2016–2017 ministry year came from Isaiah 61:10: "I will greatly rejoice in the Lord; my soul shall exult in my God, for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation; he has covered me with the robe of righteousness."

We are clothed with Christ's robe of righteousness. We are justified! "For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God" (2 Corinthians 5:21). The Bible goes on to tell us that because we are justified, and because we have Christ's "garment of grace," we are to "put on" Christ (be clothed in him). "But put on the Lord Jesus Christ, and make no provision for the flesh, to gratify its desires" (Romans 13:14), and "Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewal of your mind, that by testing you may discern what is the will of God, what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2).

"Be transformed" is an imperative, a command. That means an action for us to do. That is why Women's Ministry strives to provide many opportunities for women to be in the word of God.

God's Transforming Grace in and Through Our Priorities

Bible Studies

- Winter: Six Bible studies were offered at the North Campus and 159 women participated.
- Summer: About 170 North w 1 Peter, women studiedsing teaching from The Gospel Coalition Women's Conference of 2016.
- Fall: Nearly 200 women participated in five different Bible studies, including one in Chinese.

Titus 2 Ministry

• In January, 90 young women attended the Titus 2 Mentee Coffee.

- Titus 2 Ministry offerings included 11 focus groups, 39 book groups, and 13 one-on-one mentoring relationships.
- Ninety mentors ministered to 300 mentees.
- About 70 of our current mentors attended an appreciation event for them on November 9. They enjoyed dinner, special music, testimonies, a word of encouragement, and the opportunity to share ministry ideas with other mentors.
- More than 45 women attended one or more of the three Titus 2 Mentor Training sessions this Fall.
- The November session, "Discerning Truth From Error," was opened up to all women and 230 attended. Our guest speaker, Janet Aucoin, helped us understand what discernment is; how it differs from a critical, self-righteous spirit; and why it is important. As women and as followers of Jesus, we must be discerning in many areas as we evaluate the truth claims we hear, determine how to give guidance, and decide how to prioritize and help others to prioritize.

MOMS

- North MOMS was led by Heather Haas and Kelly Vranyes.
- On the North Campus, 59 moms were involved with 104 children in children's programming.

God's Transforming Grace in North Women's Ministry

As we settled into more campus-specific ministry this year, God continued to lead and bless.

North Women's Fall Kick-Off, September 7

- Purpose: To begin our ministry year by bringing women together for worship, encouragement and fellowship.
- Women gathered for dessert and fellowship with Becki Warnock leading worship. We heard precious stories and godly wisdom during a panel discussion of our theme for the 2017–18 year, "Contentment in Christ," based on 1 Timothy 6:6. Panel members were asked to share favorite promises or passages

of Scripture that they turn to when discontentment creeps in and also to name favorite books or authors who have helped them find contentment in Christ.

North Women's Christmas in the Commons

A gathering of 110 women braved the wintry weather for our second annual North Women's "Christmas in the Commons," an intimate evening of worship, contemplation, and fellowship as we focused our hearts on the miracle of Jesus' incarnation. Christmas cookies were served, but the true feast was the joy of Christmas with our sisters in Christ through carol-singing and Advent readings.

God's Transforming Grace in Our All-Church Events

Women's Spring Conference, May 5-6

- Purpose: To offer women the opportunity to be challenged by good Bible teaching, to fellowship with each other, and to spend quiet time with the Lord.
- Theme: "Transforming Grace"
- Held at the North Campus; 723 women attended.
- Nancy Guthrie was our guest speaker and Debra Stokes led worship. A team of about 150 volunteers from all three campuses worked together for this event.

Holiday Craft Boutique, November 17–18

- Purpose: To provide fellowship and encouragement for Bethlehem women who make crafts to support missions, ministries, and their own households.
- Hundreds of women and their families viewed 100 tables representing Bethlehem families and their crafts.
- Lonnie Peterson organized this event with the help of Valerie Block and Sara Neibergall.

All-Church Winter Retreat

Kind sovereignty was the banner flying over students and leaders from all three campuses at Trout Lake Camp the weekend of January 27-29. God's robust control over hard things was on display before all who attended, both in little things like a broken-down bus and also in large ways through our times in the word. Tim Cain (TCT Church Planter at Kaleo Church in El Cajon, California) returned to serve our group as the retreat speaker for the second year. What is Jesus doing? According to the above text, he is sanctifying, keeping, coming, calling, and doing. Here are a few of the things that he is doing in the North Jr High ministry.

Move North

The year 2017 was a very busy one. God saw fit to lead the Katterson family to purchase a home in Circle Pines. We moved in January. I graduated from Bethlehem College & Seminary in May, and I began full-time ministry as a pastoral resident in June. I love to minister to and with Jr High students and their families. Amy, our boys, and I have found a warm and receptive home at the North Campus.

Shortly after our move to the north suburbs, we hosted the Jr High boys for Strength & Beauty Night (commonly known as purity night) in our large garage. It was a time of looking at Jesus in Mark 14. We saw how Jesus displayed strength and how it differed from the world's displays of strength. Gathered in another location, the Jr High ladies looked at Jesus' definition of beauty against what the world defines as beauty.

Summer Highlights

Summer Camp was a particular highlight. Our theme was "Redeemer," and Pastor Jason Meyer led us through the book of Ruth. The camp was shepherded by an unusually large number of pastors this year. This proved providential as one of our young ladies (Grade 8) experienced the expulsion of demons, and a significant need was felt for a strong pastoral presence. The Holy Spirit began a great work there, of which we are still feeling the effects.

The summer culminated with a new event for Grade 8 students: "Duluth in a Day" trip. We retreated to Duluth and spent time playing, eating, climbing up a river, and dreaming about what God might do with them in the year ahead. It was a fruitful time for me to get to know this older group better and to ask the Lord how they can best be served.

Fall Features

The Fall kicked off on Sundays with the worldview curriculum entitled "Your Word is Truth." Mitch Pearson and I continue to alternate teaching. The team of mentors is strong this year. On Wednesdays, we use the Swedish Bible study method to study the text of the coming sermon. One of my aims in Jr High is that the students begin to read the word for themselves and begin to hear Jesus speak to them through the text. It has been a joy to lead them and guide the discovery.

Coinciding with the Convergence Conference this Fall, I have felt a need to increase prayer in many areas. I have invited the Jr & Sr High parents and leaders to pray for youth once per month on Sunday. We have gathered and prayed. I greatly desire for more prayer and more of the Spirit's leading in this ministry. May Jesus pour himself out on these Jr High students in such a way that they turn to him, see him, and love him with all their hearts.

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named, that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.—Ephesians 3:14–19

This year has been a season of ministry efforts designed to strengthen and build up the people of the South Campus both spiritually and relationally. Strategically, our ministry efforts coincided with the first year of Bethlehem's 25-month "Fill These Cities: "25 x '25" vision to 1) plant churches, 2) reach the unengaged peoples of the world, 3) strengthen the core values and vision of our church, and 4) build a 24/7 presence building for our South Campus. In the following paragraphs, I want to simply highlight a few of the main efforts we have made toward these goals.

Under the vision to "strengthen the core," we hosted our first campus-specific marriage retreat March 10–11 at a beautiful facility in nearby Chaska. Led and hosted by elder Phil Nelson with his wife, Holly, we heard personal testimonies from three South Campus couples, prayed together, and enjoyed the relaxing atmosphere of the retreat center with the 51 couples who attended. Many reported being encouraged and strengthened in their marital relationships by those who shared their testimonies and by the opportunity to meet and spend time with others from the South Campus. We believe that healthy marriages are key to the building up our church.

Another area of strengthening was a fresh look at our Sunday morning worship schedule and our discipleship curriculum for Sunday School. In September, we launched our Fall classes with a new curriculum correlated for children, youth, and adults: *The Gospel Project*®. This theologically-rich curriculum allows all ages to study the same portions of Scripture with age-appropriate levels of instruction. Families can then debrief together on what they are learning. We have heard positive responses as our people have come to appreciate this alignment.

We also shifted to begin our Sunday morning schedule with Sunday School at 9am and then to gather for the morning in worship at 10:30am. While not meeting everyone's personal preferences, we have found that this arrangement enables teachers to have ample time

to prepare to teach without feeling rushed following the worship service. The time change allows teachers and workers to linger in fellowship with others after the worship service, which we believe is healthy. The later worship start time is also appealing to visitors and families with very young children or children with disabilities.

In July, we took a huge step forward in strengthening our South Campus ministry by appointing six new deacons: Denny & Bonnie Williams, Greg Gee, Jack & Marilyn Olwell, and Mary Hendricks. These men and women were set apart to work in the areas of hospitality/welcome, benevolence, widow/orphan care, and crisis/meal ministry. This step is a valuable help to the elders in strengthening our capabilities for congregational care. Now we are dreaming about new ways to expand our deacon ministry in the areas of disability and immigrant care.

We value the pursuit of ethnic harmony at Bethlehem. On February 26, the South Campus Choir joined with a predominately African American church choir from Greater Friendship Missionary Baptist Church for an evening of spirituals, laments, and Gospel songs. We entitled it the "Better Together" festival. By worshiping together, we believe that we are working to build lasting relationships and break down walls of racial hostility for the sake of the gospel witness across the Twin Cities. It has become an annual highlight for our choir, and we are planning on doing it again in February 2018.

In addition to the ongoing and incredible ministry events we have for our women, we believe that one way to strengthen the spiritual fabric of our church is through specific ministry to our men, both young and old. On April 29, we hosted a Men's Retreat at a farm south of the metro. More than 90 men gathered for a day to worship, study the Word, build relationships, and strengthen the resolve to battle for purity together. This retreat is a significant ministry opportunity to challenge our men toward spiritual leadership and to encourage our youth toward manhood. We hope to make this retreat an annual event.

We at South Campus are thrilled to have a part in Bethlehem's 25 x '25 vision for planting churches. On April 2, the Northfield Community Church was officially launched in Northfield, Minnesota, under the leadership of church planter, Pastor Jonathon Woodward and Elder Dave Filzen. A core group of about 35 began public ministry in the local community room of a bank in Northfield. Current attendance is around 80 people.

The Republic of Ireland is the most "unreached" English-speaking country in the world—an ironic statement, given the strong historic presence of the Catholic Church. This fact, along with our ongoing short-term ministry investments in Catholic communities in Northern Ireland, was the impetus for sending 54 people to travel to both Ireland and Northern Ireland for two weeks in June to sing and testify to the beauty and centrality of Jesus Christ. The Treasuring Christ in Ireland Choir had the opportunity to sing in four Catholic churches, a Gaelic immersion school, a nursing home, two new Evangelical church plants, and numerous "street music" settings. Each performance was received with warmth and significant interest in the gospel. In so many ways, this ministry trip was the trip of a lifetime.

For the sake of this report, I have saved the most strategic (by far) for last. In a special meeting on April 2, the Bethlehem congregation voted to move forward with a new 51,000-sq-ft South Campus building. Hallelujah! On Sunday, September 24, we gathered at 3pm on the 12-acre site along I-35 and put 12 spades in the ground to ceremonially launch the construction phase. We were joined by representatives from Tradition Bank (our lender), the Anderson Companies (our builder), Lampert Architecture Firm, building committee members, and past and current pastors. God is at work, "Aslan is on the move," and we are so thankful to God for his provision for us. We are praying and laboring to be the light of God's truth to Lakeville and its surrounding communities. Presently, our occupancy of the new building is planned for early September 2018.

The church of Jesus Christ is a "dynamic" community; it is always changing. I am so thankful for the dynamic staff team that God has given us at the South Campus. Sadly, we said goodbye to Tracy Anderson, our nursery coordinator. We value Tracy and wish her the best in

her new teaching career. We welcome to staff Justin & Lindsey Smith (welcome to Bethlehem College & Seminary as well)! Lindsey is replacing Tracy as nursery coordinator and Justin has been added to strengthen our ministry to Jr High students. Already this couple has made a huge impact. We also said goodbye to Krissy Porath, who served as coordinator for children and adults under Pastor Aaron Davitch. We pray God's blessing upon her as she transitions to a church plant in Sauk Rapids, Minnesota.

Moving forward, our heart's desire continues to be that Jesus would be the Head of all things at the South Campus, and that the Spirit of Christ would continue to unite us together in faith and truth to care for one another in love that we might be the aroma of Christ to those around us.

SOUTH SMALL GROUPS, ADULT DISCIPLESHIP, AND CHILDREN & FAMILY DISCIPLESHIP

I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers, that the God of our Lord Jesus Christ, the Father of glory, may give you the Spirit of wisdom and of revelation in the knowledge of him.—Ephesians 1:16–17

This year I completed my seventh year of ministry on staff at Bethlehem. It has been a great privilege to serve the Lord here at Bethlehem. I love the people and the camaraderie we have among the South Campus staff. In this review for my ministry area, I will share some highlights and some new initiatives.

A Few Highlights From 2017

South Marriage Retreat

One of the goals of the South Campus elders and pastoral team has been to invest in healthy marriages. Toward that end, we held our first South Campus Marriage Retreat in early March at the Oak Ridge Hotel & Conference Center in Chaska. The theme for the retreat was "Stories of Grace and Growth" and featured a variety of testimonies from couples at the South Campus. The goals for the retreat were that marriages would be enriched, community would be developed, and that we would take a step forward in creating a gracerich culture where it is safe to be vulnerable and admit our struggles while celebrating God's grace to grow us. The retreat greatly exceeded our expectations in terms of turnout (102 people attended), enthusiasm, and feedback after the event.

South Men's Retreat

Another big highlight for me this past year was the South Campus Men's Retreat in April: "Man Up!" It was a one-day retreat at Pickleberry Farm in Webster, Minnesota. We had a full, rich day of food, fellowship, and activities. Bethlehem College & Seminary professor Joe Rigney came and challenged us from Colossians 3:I—II to "man up" in the area of purity. We had small group discussions and heard a testimony from a brother about God's grace and growth in the area of purity. I was glad that many fathers and sons could attend together. We had about 100 men ranging in age from 13 to 70-something. It seemed the Lord's face shone upon that day and that he once again exceeded my expectations.

Vacation Bible School

This year we held our second South Campus Vacation Bible School. We used the *Galactic Starveyors* curriculum and focused on how the God who created everything wants to have a relationship with us. The five lessons of the week told the story of the gospel. We aimed for "high fun and deep truth." It was a joy to see the many gifts and skills of the people at the South Campus come together to make this a great week. About 50 people helped serve in various ways; set design, decorations, teaching, small group leading, running games, leading worship, doing skits, serving snacks, and serving on the security and medical team. We had 116 kids come through the South 501 Building that week. God was glorified, kids had fun, and the gospel was taught. It was a great week.

Some New Initiatives

Children's Sunday School Curriculum Change This Fall, we tried a new children's curriculum for Sunday School called The Gospel Project®. This curriculum is a three-year chronological Christ-Centered study of the whole Bible for children, youth, and adults. There are several reasons why we wanted to use this curriculum—here are the top three. First, it is Christcentered and gospel-centered! Second, it teaches the "Big-Picture Story" of the Bible. Lastly, it is a unified curriculum, meaning that it teaches the same Bible lesson on different learning levels each week to each group (children, youth, adults). The unified nature of the curriculum enables the whole family to study the same thing, and equips parents to do discipleship in the home. I've been encouraged to see that about sixty people attend our adult class each week.

Parent Equipping Efforts

In addition to switching to a unified curriculum, we have implemented a few other new efforts to encourage and equip parents. Daniel Viezbicke, *Pastor for Youth & Family Discipleship*, and I are offering parent workshops on a range of topics. This Fall, we hosted a seminar on Intentional Discipleship in the Home. We taught on a vision for discipleship in the home and invited three couples to share what they do to intentionally disciple their children.

We hosted a wonderful Family Night event. In October, we had a Reformation 500 Party to celebrate God's grace in the Protestant Reformation. We had a great night of worship, teaching, games, and snacks.

We also started setting up a Parent Resource Corner by the Sunday School rooms each week at Lakeville South High School where we can highlight and give away resources to parents.

Connect Lunches

In an effort to help connect newcomers and those who have been attending Bethlehem for a while but are still looking to get connected, we are hosting monthly "Connect Lunches." These are hosted by our new deacons for hospitality, Jack & Marilyn Olwell, on the first Sunday of every month. Elders and staff attend as well.

Small Group Connect

To further help those looking to get connected into the small group community at the South Campus, we are now providing another on–ramp event, called "Small Group Connect." These events are advertised and held after the Sunday service where small group leaders of open groups meet to talk with those looking for a group. We had our first "Group Connect" in October, with 10 small group leaders representing a variety of open groups.

God Doing a New Thing in Events

Fall Retreat, October 21

On a rainy Saturday morning, 74 women gathered at the Minnesota Landscape Arboretum for the first South Campus Women's Retreat. Testimonies were shared on our theme of being "Rooted, Renewed, and Refreshed: Rooted and Built Up In Him" (Colossians 2:7). The vulnerable sharing of the speakers led to vulnerable sharing and many tears during table discussions. The Lord did a deep spiritual work in many hearts that day. After lunch, we walked the trails and enjoyed the grounds of the beautiful Arboretum. Many new, Christ-centered friendships began that day and many others grew to a deeper level. The women received a booklet with worship lyrics and resources for their daily devotional time.

Christmas Celebration, December 1

The first South Campus Women's Christmas Celebration on December 1 was an evening to "Celebrate Tidings of Great Joy." We packed the South 501 Building with 102 women. Many brought family members and friends, some of whom were not believers, who sung and heard the great truths of the gospel. The women enjoyed a dessert buffet, worship, Advent devotions, and fellowship.

God Doing a New Thing in Leadership

Women's Theology Sunday School Class

New in February 2017, was a women's Sunday School Class, "Theology for Women," led by a South Campus Elder Bruce Power. The purpose of the class was to provide training for current and future Women's Ministry leaders (18 women attended).

Convergence Conference

In October, I was able to attend the Convergence Conference with our pastors and elders. Attending a conference like this was a new thing for me. I came away with a hunger to know my Heavenly Father's personal love for me in a deeper way and to minister out of that love. One of the greatest blessings was the team building that happened during our travel and meal times.

Campus-Specific Ministry Team

Therefore be imitators of God, as beloved children. And walk in love, as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us, a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God.—Ephesians 5:1–2

We are rightly amazed by the doctrine of justification that the Protestant Reformation recovered 500 years ago; we delight in the God who justifies sinners apart from any of our works! And I personally am still amazed at how the justification of sinners by God leads us on to sanctification and glorification. This summer, at our two-day retreat for incoming and outgoing Sr High seniors, we focused on walking in love, in light, and in wisdom from Ephesians 5. God works in his people—of all ages—to delight them with a whole salvation.

We pray that the youth among us would seek to imitate Jesus because they discover that they are beloved. This motivation is justification and sanctification working together. The banner over the child of God is love. So, with all this grace poured out for believers, where did we see this grace in youth ministry at the South Campus in 2017?

Grace to the Viezbicke's

This year we continued to settle into our new home in Burnsville. By my count, we had youth over at our house over two dozen times, plus innumerable times with families and students just "dropping in." We love using our home for hospitality, and my wife's gifts of foodmaking and home-making flourish with tons of people in our home (and my latent grilling hobby gets used quite often as well).

Our third child, Eden Lisa Mae, joined Caedmon and Helen this July. She is an abounding grace to us; the late nights, the early mornings, and other things that come with having a new child are all so very worth it.

We've also grown in deeper friendships at Bethlehem—our small group of about a dozen adults (and about the same number of kids!) feels increasingly like family. My fellow

pastors at the South Campus are dear brothers whom I've locked arms with for the sake of the gospel. God is indeed good to grant us such grace through Bethlehem!

Grace to Bethlehem's South Campus Youth

God's grace has been evident throughout the year at Bethlehem. Here are three tangible snippets of what God has been doing among the youth at the South Campus.

First, Jr High participation has grown. A large factor in this growth is the continued involvement of Sr High students discipling Jr High students. Over a dozen Sr High students volunteered at Jr High Summer Camp this year, supplying over half the total student volunteers for the camp. Typically, around a dozen participate in our "Sr High takeover days" when Sr High students volunteer in the Jr High classroom.

Second, in the late summer we hired Justin Smith to help oversee Jr High ministry. Justin and his family have been a joy to have around the South Campus. I'm anticipating growth in his role as he takes on more responsibilities and continues to go deeper in relationships among our youth and their families.

Third, we saw God bring students to faith and grow students in their faith. Several students were converted this year; some students professed Christ for the first time and other's long-held beliefs met a passionate heart cry of worship for the first time. We praise God for his work among us. Also, seven students were baptized this year. We continue to ask God to draw students into closer fellowship with each other and the church, especially through membership.

I could continue to write extensively about other more "intangible" signs of growth: young men and women growing in grace, friendships formed on long van rides, and movements of the Spirit to convict of sin and bring power for the Christian walk. We praise God for all of these things.

Grace for the New Year

This year is the second time South Campus youth will participate in a total of five retreats—two with the other campuses and three that are specific to South Campus. In the next two years, we'll seek to add a sixth retreat for those transitioning from Jr High to Sr High.

We are anticipating the completion of the new South Campus building, with a combined total of almost 3,000 sq. ft. for youth. My wife and I have explored some possibilities for what to do with the space; we will be asking parents and youth for more feedback and help as we get closer to the opening of the building (Godwilling) in the Fall of 2018.

We are also pondering some changes for the Fall of 2018. Most significant is moving to a Middle School model (similar to the shift the Downtown Campus made this year). We will have a meeting in January to discuss these changes with parents and get plenty of feedback.

We are thankful to be in ministry here. We trust that God will continue to weave our hearts together with the flock of God that is among us.

SHORT-TERM MINISTRY MOBILIZATION

Our philosophy for short-term ministry is to support our 112 global partners who serve around the world. We want to encourage them, love them, and come alongside them in the greatest cause in the universe: the spread of the gospel and seeing the name of Jesus glorified to the ends of the earth. This year we sent 18 teams and approximately 189 people to assist our global partners.

Americas

Obio

Vaughn Blackburn led a team of 8 to partner with the Schwartz family by encouraging those who are and will be serving behind the scenes in missionary aviation. As the adults were in the plenary session for the spiritual life conference, the team worked with the children.

Costa Rica

A team of 5 went to serve with Global Partner April Campbell. The focus of the trip was to pray for April's ministries and those with whom she interacts.

Bethlehem Hosted a Team from the Dominican Republic
A team of 25 from the Dominican Republic traveled
to Minneapolis to partner with us in ministry. This
Dominican team was from the church that we partner
with when we send teams to the DR. While here the
team ministered in a variety of ways from assisting with
home repairs, helping lead a VBS on the Little Earth
Reservation, serving at Feed My Starving Children,
assisting with and distributing food at Jericho Road, and
working at Hope Academy.

The Dominican Republic/Haiti

Nathan Metcalf, Ken Schlorf, and Michelle Ryan led a team of 15 to help a long-term partnering church in the Dominican Republic with evangelism, light construction, and VBS on five sites. The team also traveled to Haiti to do VBS in a village.

San Diego

Pastor Jon Nowlin and Mary Butler led a team of 14 who partnered with Tim Cain, a TCT church planter in San Diego, for a project called "Serve the City." The team helped lead a basketball camp and other service projects around the city.

Houston

A team of 24 traveled to Houston to assist in hurricane clean up. The team partnered with a church that provided a place to sleep and meals. The team went into the community to assist homeowners with clean up and to pray with and witness to the homeowners.

Africa

Senegal

It was an honor to serve the Lord and this congregation in 2017 as the *Financial Secretary*. There is also a team of dedicated volunteers who collect, sort, count, and tally the offering each week. They are a blessing as they work behind the scenes to make sure that donor's gifts are processed as intended.

In 2017, the twenty-five month "Fill These Cities: 25 x '25" initiative continued with months 2–13, contributing toward more than 1,300 faith commitments totaling more than \$17,400,000 (to be fulfilled through December 31, 2018). During the campaign, all contributions to Church & Missions and Fill These Cities are combined as our congregationally approved "One Fund" (through December 31, 2018). Our Lord has blessed marvelously through the fulfilling of commitments to date, along with other donations by individuals and families who call Bethlehem their church home. The benefits of these contributions can be seen throughout the preceding ministry reports that highlight the four priorities of the Fill These Cities initiative.

The contributions toward the budget (Church & Missions and Fill These Cities accounts) in 2017 totaled \$10,946,676. This was an 5% decrease from the 2016 budget contributions that totaled \$11,534,086, which included the special December 2016 one-time over and above gifts to jumpstart the 25 months of Fill These Cities. In addition to budget giving in 2017, special designated gifts of \$776,741 were applied directly toward our South Campus building project and designated gifts of \$139,542 were applied toward the "Funding the Filling" existing mortgage reduction fund. We applied these gifts to our existing mortgage balance, along with our budgeted mortgage payments.

This year we implemented our new Online Giving platform, which has provided significant increases in online giving capability, including "text to give" options and improved communications regarding online donations. The utilization of online giving continues to grow. In 2017, 42% (up from 37%) of the Church & Missions contributions were made through our online giving portal. Setting up recurring giving schedules via the online portal is a great way for a donor to remove the weekly or monthly check writing process from their schedule when a regular recurring amount is anticipated to be given. It is also encouraged that online donors migrate to contributing through a bank account rather than credit card to assist in reducing our electronic transaction fees and potentially incurring personal financing charges on donor's card balances.

In 2017, a total of 6,525 families, individuals, and organizations gave recorded contributions to the church, short-term ministry programs, Campus Outreach, and other ministries of the church. This number includes 2,529 donors from 2,268 families contributing to the One Fund budget.

My prayer for the coming year is that each person who calls Bethlehem their church home will continue to count the blessings of the Lord to them, and "contribute cheerfully and regularly to the support of the ministry, the expenses of the church, the relief of the poor, and the spread of the gospel through all nations" (Bethlehem's Church Covenant).

The year 2017 was our first full year of the "Fill These Cities: 25 x '25" initiative and another strong year of giving at Bethlehem, with giving toward our One Fund operating budget totalling \$10,947K. The budget was set at \$10,700K, but actual spending was \$10,337K as the staff diligently managed expenses to remain below budget.

2017 Highlights

- Contributions to the One Fund operating budget were down \$578K (-5%) from 2016, but this comparison includes the strong December 2016 giving at the start of the "25x '25" initiative—and it does not include \$776K of designated gifts (over and above the budget) toward the South Campus project in 2017.
- Net spending was up \$486K (5%), reflecting increases for the four main priorities in the "25 x '25" vision.
- Outstanding external debt at year-end was \$2,896, which was down \$458K (14%).

- The line of credit was at zero as of December 31, 2017.
- Total cash for all funds was \$3,912K as of December 31, 2017.

In 2017, the regional CPA firm CliftonLarsonAllen audited our 2016 financial statements. An audit report is available upon request. Additional unaudited financial details for 2017 are provided on the following pages. If you have any questions related to the finances, please contact the church office and we will be happy to answer them.

The congregation of Bethlehem Baptist Church held six business meetings in 2017:

- January 29, Quarterly Strategy Meeting
- April 2, Special Strategy Meeting
- April 30, Quarterly Strategy Meeting
- July 30, Quarterly Strategy Meeting
- October 29, Quarterly Strategy meeting
- December 17, Annual Business Meeting

The outcome of these congregational meetings is summarized by topic below.

Officers, Elders, Deacons, and Ministers

- On April 30, Bethlehem called Steven Lee as Lead Pastor, North Campus; Bryan Pickering as Minister for Care & Counseling, Downtown Campus; and Daniel Viezbicke as Minister for Youth and Family Discipleship, South Campus.
- On December 17, Bethlehem reaffirmed Vocational Elders Sam Crabtree, Ken Currie, Jon Grano, Jason Meyer, and Tom Steller to another three-year term; reaffirmed Vocational Minister Brad Nelson to another three-year term; reaffirmed Non-Vocational Elders Tom Dodds, Tim Held, James Lecheler, Bruce Power, and Steve Walmsley to another three-year term; called Properties Director Scott Brueske and Treasurer Adam Sexton to three-year terms as Deacons; elected Steve Walmsley to a one-year term as *Financial Secretary*, Adam Sexton to a one-year term as *Treasurer*, and Benjamin Holvey and Jacob Smith to one-year terms as *Church Clerks*.

Revision of Constitution and Bylaws

Bethlehem Voted to Amend Article IV, Section 1, Subsection G:

• From "Approve the call, job description and initial salary of Vocational Pastors and Ministers." To "Approve the call and job description of those Elders who receive compensation from the Church for fulfilling their Elder responsibilities."

Constitutional Change Summary:

- Eliminates the categories of "vocational minister" and "vocational pastor" as constitutionally stipulated.
- Eliminates the standard of the entire congregation approving salaries of Staff-Elders.
- Provides greater biblical clarity that "Elder" and "Pastor" are the same office.
- Provides ground for "Staff Elders" to be defined by their responsibilities as "Elder." That is, avoiding the situation in which one is deemed a "Staff Elder" simply because they are employed by the Church as opposed to fulfilling Elder responsibilities.

Bethlehem Voted to Amend the Following Bylaws:

Article I: Membership

 Section 1 PROCEDURE; Section 2 INSTRUCTION TO NEW MEMBERS; Section 3 REMOVAL OF MEMBERS

Summary of Changes for Membership

- Removes archaic membership practices.
- Provides greater clarity on the responsibilities for members, congregation, and Elders toward meaningful membership.

Article II: Church Government

- Section 1 OFFICERS OF THE CHURCH
- Section 2 ELDERS: A. Qualifications,
 B. Responsibilities, C. Composition, D. Call by the Church, E. Organization
- Section 3 DEACONS: A. Qualifications,
 B. Responsibilities, C. Composition, D. Call
 by the Church, E. Organization
- Section 4 REMOVAL: A. By Resignation, B. Grievance, C. Lack Reaffirmation
- Section 5 LICENSING AND ORDINATION

Summary of Changes to Church Government

- Clarifies that Elders and Deacons are the biblical officers of the Church while Elders are the legal officers of the church.
- Establishes "Staff" and "Non-Staff" Elders while removing "Vocational Minister," "Vocational Pastor," "Vocational Elder," and "Lay Elder."
- Clarifies that the designation "Staff Elder" is tied to responsibilities and not employment.

- Simplifies and brings continuity of direction for Elders and Deacons in qualifications, responsibilities, composition, call by the Church, and organization.
- Retains the essence of Elder and Deacon roles.
- Removes the mandatory 2:1 ratio of Non-Staff to Staff Elders.
- Removes the compulsory year off for Non-Staff Elders
- Clarifies Bethlehem's ordination standard.

South Campus

On April 2, Bethlehem approved a motion to sign contracts, secure financing, increase budget, and accelerate debt service in order to build and fund a South Campus facility in 2017.

Budget

 On January 29, Bethlehem approved a \$10.6M One Fund operating budget for 2017 and committed \$1.5M of 2016 overage toward construction of a South Campus facility. • On April 2, Bethlehem increased the One Fund operating budget from \$10.6M to \$10.7M to cover up to \$100,000 of expected 2017 construction loan interest and loan closing costs associated with construction of a South Campus facility.

Church Membership

At the end of 2017, the membership roll stood at 2,733. Over the year, church action removed 469 members and 259 new members were welcomed into the church.
